3. Due to majority of population are not financially sound and also ignorance , the students are not capable to get professional education.

1. Availability of contemporary Infrastructure and Learning Resources

As our college is established with the goals, to provide opportunities of higher education to the poor, needy and especially to the down-trodden, depressed, tribal and the backward communities of the society, to impart knowledge, to develop professional and vocational skills and provide opportunities for excellence, to promote virtues such as scientific temperament, secularism, national integration, commitment to social reformations and progress, humanism, social justice and equality among the students, to bridge the gap between theoretical knowledge and professional practice. In short to do everything this will go towards betterment of the people in general and particularly the weaker and downtrodden people of society. To achieve these goals the availability of contemporary infrastructure and learning resources is very much essential.

In “Infrastructure and Learning Resources” which are in vogue or adopted / adapted by the institution such as, computer facility with high-speed broadband internet access helps the

student to find the reference material and other information. It also helps the students to browse for websites regarding educational institutes and scholarships. to complete academic assignments, to see the recent amendments, pending bills, judgments of higher judiciary etc. Provision of updated database of e-resources which includes the High Court and Supreme Court cases and Center and State legislations helps the students to get instant references. The equipments like Camera, Video-Camera, Mikes and Sound system are made available to co-curricular, extra-curricular activities.

Staff and students are regularly make use of all such facilities and enhancing their knowledge/getting up-to-date essential information. Availability of all such facilities to them, they are becoming well aware with contemporary legal arena and their level of confidence is also increased and also resulted into not having any kind of inferiority complex in their mind. They have not only participated in various competitions like debates, Moot-Court etc. but also win the prizes. Now staff and students are full of enthusiastic and it results in their better performance in the college co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

As most of the students were not conversant with all this facilities they were facing problems like how to handle the equipments properly, how to make use of it for regular studies etc. To solve these problems, teachers were always ready to help them and if required the help of concerning expert were called by the college. And with regular use of it, now they are feeling comfortable with it. In addition to this, as per the need, the institution with the help of a team of gardeners, sweepers, electricians, plumbers and carpenters supervise and maintain the premises and infrastructure of our institute to its original glory.

2. Student Support and Progression

By keeping in mind the vision & missions of the college always focuses towards the betterment of students .As the majority of the students come from rural background and also many of the students have opted for the vernacular medium of instructions till graduation, the college has started a bridge course to supplement the language deficiency that is 'Spoken English' course free of cost. It helps the student to gain better understanding and confidence for the law course. Even personal attention is paid by the teachers towards weaker and meritorious students. For addressing various problems and deficiencies in the working of the college the college has devised a mechanism that is Grievance Redressal Cell which takes cognizance of various problems and it helps to improve the working of the college.

In order to achieve gender justice access of all facilities are given, without any kind of discrimination. To give the direction to the ambitions of the students and to canalize their efforts towards the same the faculty participates in academic and personal counseling. It helps the student to focus on the goals to be achieved by them. Majority of the students opt for the profession in law as an advocate and initially they do have lot of inferiority complex about legal profession. So to remove such inferiority complex, college regularly arranges the Legal Literacy Camp in collaboration with Malegaon Advocate Bar Association and Taluka Legal Service Committee, wherein students get the opportunity to be in touch with the advocate, judges and other experts as well. In addition to this college does court visit and police station visits of students regularly.
